Duplin County Animal Waste Class a Success

Animal waste operators are required to obtain six hours of continuing education credit within a three year cycle. Each pig farm in North Carolina with 250 or more pigs is required to have at least one certified animal waste operator for each farm. The National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH) estimates that every day about 100 agricultural workers suffer a lost-work-time injury. Duplin County produces nearly 500 animal waste operators who work on farms each day and agriculture is the number one economic producer of the county.

In response to these needs, Cooperative Extension in Duplin County provided a continuing education class for animal waste operators, pesticide applicators, and waste water operators that focused on safety. Cooperative Extension partnered with NC Wildlife, NC Agromedicine Institute, Extension Agents from Duplin and nearby counties, and NC Division of Environmental Quality to offer this instruction. More than 78 people attended and had the opportunity for at least six hours of credit. Agromedicine-related sessions included shop safety, chest compression CPR, ergonomics, hearing conservation, prevention of heat-related illness and skin cancer and first aid.

As a result of the class, 61 animal waste operators earned 2 hours in the first session, 74 animal waste operators earned 2 hours in the second session, and 78 animal waste operators earned 2 hours in the last session. In addition, 16 waste water operators earned 6 hours of credit and 7 pesticide applicators earned 30 minutes and 16 pesticide applicators earned an hour of credit. Seventy-two percent of respondents said they increased knowledge and 69% said they intended to make safety improvements and/or be better prepared to respond to an accident on their farm as a result of the instruction. Respondents collectively said they saved 6 weeks and 2 days of time as a result of the class, a savings of about \$11,848 based on the Bureau of Labor Statistics. Respondents also said they collectively saved \$37,500 in production costs as a result of the class.
